Laura (Perseus HLTA) has been a real champion for learning outside the classroom and being more in touch with our natural surroundings in order to generalise skills. With our integrated HLTA leads for Strathmore specialist strategies, we continue to combine therapeutic approaches into our learning, and this has been particularly prevalent in our educational visits over the last 18 months – more important now than ever before in a Covid-impacted society.

Penel (Andromeda) led a trip with a special "first time" experience: cycling to an offsite educational visit. This is so good for physical development, maintaining good health, developing independent skills and social awareness and also reducing our carbon emissions. The learners have been fantastic in their commitment, behaviour and efforts. They seem to have really enjoyed the experience of being in the community and practical application of the skills learnt in the playground.

As with everything we do, there are many people involved with the behind the scenes logistics and compliance. Thanks to FOSS for the charitable support for funding our variety of accessible bikes and to our staff for always being up for the next challenge in order to ensure our learners are making holistic progress and mustering the enthusiasm for doing the things that may be out of their comfort zone, in order to expand the opportunities for the learners.




There was lots of smiling, laughter, and communication for 'more'.

Highlights at Russell Campus:


- Learners in Leo Class have developed their swimming skills at Teddington Pool, supported by Annabelle, our swimming teacher.










Hercules Class




















Luna class

Marble Hill Play Centre




Nova class have thoroughly enjoyed exploring the play centre at Marble Hill. We have been visiting the site every week for the whole of Autumn 2.

Perseus class




Perseus class have had a great Autumn term.

It has been a great opportunity for parents to join in too.



Michael who can already swim has been showing us his skills underwater.


Amelie, Ethan, Adonai, Zaki and Pascal have all been moving in the water independently and are working towards reducing the amount of flotation aids they need in the water.
