
Home Education – Summer 1 – Weeks 3 and 4 Writing - Composition (Handwriting and pencil control – OT input included)

Please continue to offer your child handwriting opportunities and sensory exploration to encourage the development of fine motor skills and control. If you do these on walls, tables and the floor it will build strength further. There are ideas on weeks 1+2 planning for a range of abilities.

Now we are thinking about how we are 'composing' and writing for a purpose. This can range from verbally explaining and labelling, to drawing, typing or ordering pictures/symbols to create a narrative.

(even if it just helps to set the context every day, the repeated song each day will get your child's attention)

Ideas for composition activities:



'CHECKIE' app. This is good for your child who may not be ready for typing but can use pictures to create a *checklist* for different things they are doing at home. Try this for going out on walks, helping with cooking, chill time. Help them to compose a 'list' of all the things they need.



'Piig Talk' walkie talkie app. This is an app where verbal learners are able to record clips of themselves talking and it will repeat it back to them in a funny voice. They are also able to record clips to send via email. It may be motivating to send voice clips to their teachers or family members.





 Cabelling photos of family member
Labelling photos of family or pictures from magazines/newspapers. This can

either be typed or handwritten. Talk with your child about the pictures, perhaps they can choose them themselves. Support with writing but allow them to attempt spelling phonetically and don't worry if words are spelt wrong.

'My Story' app will help your child to develop fine motor skills by drawing and swiping as well as using their narration skills to comment on their drawings.
